## Monthly Spotlight:

# Along Side Ministries

Along Side Ministries is a Christian nonprofit organization based in Phoenix, Arizona, dedicated to discipling and equipping incarcerated men and women for successful reintegration into society. For over 25 years, they have mobilized the Body of Christ to provide both spiritual and practical guidance to incarcerated individuals, aiming to transform lives through mentorship and support, and engage them in Christian discipleship. Together with their dedicated volunteers, supportive church partners, generous donors, and valuable relationships within the Arizona Department of Corrections, Along Side Ministries has conducted thousands of services: Church services, small group Bible studies, mentoring sessions, praise & worship musical events, baptisms, and discipleship group sessions.

*Their comprehensive approach includes inside prison ministry, outside prison mentorship, and aftercare programs, resulting in a remarkable success rate where 97% of their program graduates remain out of prison after release.*

In terms of incarceration statistics, Arizona has one of the highest imprisonment rates in the United States. As of 2018, there were 41,794 people in the Arizona prison system. Between 2000 and 2016, the state's per capita imprisonment rate increased by 20%. Additionally, in 2015, pretrial detainees constituted 74% of the total jail population in Arizona. Along Side Ministries play a crucial role in addressing these challenges by providing support and resources to help formerly incarcerated individuals successfully reintegrate into the community, thereby reducing recidivism rates. Their approach is structured into three distinct phases:

# Along Side Ministries

### **Phase 1: Inside Prison Ministry: Discipleship, Mentoring & Preparation for Reentry**

Volunteers from local churches engage with incarcerated men and women, providing spiritual guidance and practical support to help them develop a strong foundation for life after prison.

### **Phase 2: Outside Prison Ministry: Safe Housing and Successful Transition to Independent Living**

Upon release, participants enter the second phase, which offers residential support and mentorship. Along Side Ministries provides housing and assists individuals in finding employment, fostering accountability, and developing life skills essential for independent living. This phase aims to ensure a smooth transition back into the community.

### **Aftercare and Alumni Support**

The final phase emphasizes ongoing mentorship and support. Participants continue to receive guidance as they navigate the challenges of reintegration, with a focus on maintaining their commitment to personal growth and community involvement. This sustained support network is crucial for long-term success. Through this structured outreach program, Along Side Ministries has provided both spiritual and practical guidance to over 300 incarcerated individuals, including Matthew Gibson.

# Along Side Ministries

By the age of 14, Matthew's parents, both alcoholics in a physically abusive marriage, divorced, leaving Matthew caught in a web of loneliness while moving between his dad's, mom's, and sister's houses. It was years of no actual structure of family life. This led to an angry and confused Matthew, who took on the values of the world and away from his Catholic upbringing.

*"When I graduated from high school, I was very sinful. I was dealing drugs. I would get high, get drunk, and sleep around - for my pleasure. I would cheat, steal, and lie."*

This lifestyle continued for years until Matthew committed murder, potentially receiving a 2nd-degree murder sentence. But Matthew had no intent to stand trial and went on the run for 17 years. There were disguises, odd jobs, still in and out of drugs, and even a six-year marriage, all while dodging the authorities.

*"I considered myself a gypsy all my life. No stability. No foundation in my life."*

It was not only the law Matthew had been running from, but also from God. This all ended when his best friend witnessed to him, reminded him of God's grace, and led him through repentance and back to God. One day, with God's help, he walked into the sheriff's office in Winslow, Arizona, and confessed to the murder 17 years earlier, wanting to make things right.

Thanks to Matthew's surrendering and his confession, the charge of second-degree murder was downgraded to manslaughter, requiring a minimum of 7 years in prison. Matthew entered prison, a new creature in Christ, and began attending worship services immediately. At the Bachman unit at Lewis Prison, he attended the ASM services and remembers having a bookmark with Along Side Ministries on it. He later asked Chaplain Rutherford about ASM and soon applied and was accepted into the program.

*"I want to thank my mentor, Dan Norcott, who kept me focused on my path."*

For more years than he can count, bad parenting had cast a long shadow over Matthew's emotional and psychological well-being. Raised in an environment marked with neglect, excessive unpredictability, and abuse, Matthew grappled with issues such as low self-esteem, anxiety, depression, and trust issues. It is only by the grace of God that Matthew is alive today. He graduated from the Along Side Ministries Discipleship Program on March 10, 2024.

**(Q) The Fresh Coast Alliance community provides peer support, evidence-based treatment, job training, mental health professionals, and individual responsibility. How do you also integrate faith-based recovery support to help residents achieve and retain lasting accomplishments such as employment and sobriety?**

**(A)** The Fresh Coast Alliance mission statement is “We are here to transform the lives of those affected by incarceration and addiction as we hope, learn, work, heal, and dream together in Christ.” We offer a whole person approach to recovery and reentry which is done from a Christian perspective. Our staff is composed of compassionate, faith-centered individuals from a variety of church backgrounds.

*Our philosophy is to show people Jesus by walking beside them as they rebuild their lives.*

Our team supports our participants by offering peer recovery coaching, job training, and employment assistance. We also offer a faith-based recovery group called Recovery on Christ (ROC) which is our highest attended group and features a shared meal hosted by a local church. We work with 10-12 local churches who provide a meal and speaker to connect our participants with a church that best fits their personal needs.

**(Q) You have been leading a dynamic organizational overhaul effort since taking the reins at FCA. How do you foresee balancing these successes and growth with staying true to your core values and mission?**

**(A)** During my first year in leadership, I had three specific goals: create a positive team culture, focus on doing fewer things but doing them with excellence, and engaging with local churches to create lasting partnerships. When I reflect on the many positive things that have happened in the last year, I'm reminded how we have been hyper-focused on carrying out our mission with excellence.

When I think about the future and expansion, my focus is on how to enhance what we already do. How can we house more individuals who need our help? How can we offer recovery groups that first shift employees can attend? Can we hire more therapists, so appointments are more readily available?

**(Q) What key circumstance(s) working in public education influenced or motivated your personal commitment to minister to inmates and the recovery community?**

**(A)** Working as a teacher in underserved communities for over 16 years really opened my eyes to the “school to prison pipeline.” Day after day, I saw my students making poor choices because they didn’t see other options. I viewed my work then, and now, as a mission field. Walking across a prison yard ten years later, hearing a former student yell “Hey, Mrs. Sparks, you were my 9th grade science teacher,” solidifies my passion for continuing to serve the people who need us most. I wanted to make a difference then as I do now.

**(Q) How are you enhancing your own professional growth and leadership approach? Have you uncovered any tools or tips to share with other busy leaders in our SUSA community?**

**(A)** A background in educational leadership has exposed me to a wide variety of leadership skills and styles. However, I had little experience in leading an organization. It's been exciting to put into practice some of the tools I taught others to use. To address my own gaps and blind spots, I have worked with experienced leaders in the nonprofit arena.

I am fortunate to have many leaders and mentors who are willing to pour into me. I also am intentional about surrounding myself with "truth tellers." I am aware of the need to have people in my life who speak honestly to me rather than saying what they think I want to hear. One of the best pieces of advice I've received is to slow down and reflect. It's hard to see or feel progress when we don't slow down long enough to see our accomplishments.

**(Q) We mention “community” frequently in this work. What role does community support play in the reentry and recovery journey at Fresh Coast Alliance, and how might people get involved in supporting your efforts?**

**(A)** Community is the center of the work that we do. We realized early on that people need to replace poor habits with positive habits to stay sober. In recovery, we talk a lot about people, places, and things. We intentionally create opportunities for people to connect by offering three community meals weekly. Each home has a family style dinner each week. We offer 18 hours of free programming/groups and several social sober events. We also have volunteer opportunities from building maintenance to cooking and serving meals to one-on-one mentoring for our participants.

*One common theme I hear from our volunteers is “I came here to be a blessing to others, but I left being blessed myself.”*

## Door of Hope

### **Door of Hope: Experiencing Holy Urgency with Megan Katerjian, CEO**

The homelessness epidemic in California, where nearly a quarter of all unhoused Americans reside, creates vulnerabilities including increased risk for criminal justice involvement, incarceration and recidivism. Its tentacles touch into all three of Serving USA's areas of focus, affecting prisoners, veterans and women in recovery. Recognizing that domestic violence is the leading cause of homelessness, in 2016 Serving USA began a partnership with Door of Hope in support of their esteemed Women's Domestic Violence Shelter and programs. Founded in 1985, Door of Hope's mission is to equip homeless families to rebuild their lives. They provide transitional housing and holistic supportive services that create a compassionate pathway to long-term life change, self-sufficiency and permanent housing for families living in the Greater Pasadena area. They serve single moms, single dads, two-parent families, domestic violence survivors and families with children.

Boldly rising to the challenge of fighting the homelessness epidemic, eight years ago CEO, Reverend Megan Katerjian, embraced the leadership role with a compassionate and strategic vision. Drawing from her previous positions as Pastor, working in nonprofits in urban Chicago, cross-cultural experiences and education, with her board, leadership team and community supporters, she has reinforced and expanded the Door of Hope to be a premiere beacon of holistic hope for the unhoused. Serving more than 1,580 families in 40 years, their specializations and location places them in the prime area for outreach to aid some of the tens of thousands of residents who have emerged homeless and displaced due to the combined impact of January's Eaton Fire and nearby Palisades Fire, which destroyed over 9,000 structures.



## Testimonial Spotlight:

*Door of Hope*

Incredibly, one of those homes lost in Altadena was Megan's own residence, which has left she and her two young children homeless. Currently experiencing her own personal devastation, she has been transparent and open, sharing online with Door of Hope supporters from her current lens of fighting homelessness while also being unhoused. Shared below is an incredibly insightful video transcript from her first week of managing her new reality. What appears quickly is her raw emotional state but unshaken faith and care for others as she asks for prayers in guidance as Door of Hope creates The Eaton Fire Housing Assistance program, a campaign to engage and assist other fire victims in affected communities.

*Within their first two weeks, the program has received more than 218 applications.*

*"I'm going to call this **holy urgency** I am feeling, and that our team is feeling, about this particular moment in addressing this crisis and where Door of Hope fits in, because we are talking to churches and neighbors and friends and so many people that are just trying to figure it out. And struggling to figure it out, and we all have trauma brain and we're not thinking clearly. We have no idea what's going on and we're getting fed so many different resources and information some of which is good some of which is bad and I'm trying to sort this through. Homeless in one sense but I'm not sleeping on a cot at the convention center. I went there to do some registration and to get some clothes and I walked into this room, and there is a sea of people that are just devastated and broken and desperate and they have nowhere to go.*



## Testimonial Spotlight:

*Door of Hope*

*I'm not literally going to be homeless for the short you know immediate or long term, because of this crisis I have friends reaching out to me offering me one bedroom, what bedroom in their house or different ways that I can keep a roof over my head at this time. But for very low-income vulnerable populations that may not have that social safety net, or that their social network has been wiped out too, they've lost their housing. This is the community that I feel this holy urgency to respond.*

*Door of Hope spends every day helping clients just figure it out right and every case is different, every case is unique, and we are navigating different public benefits and solutions and helping families identify their goals towards long-term housing and that's what everyone needs right now who just lost their home in the fire.*

*And for under-resourced communities where either they don't have the financial resources or the friendship and relationship resources, or maybe the language resources, or all those things are making large numbers of families very, very vulnerable to homelessness. They are literally homeless right now but if we don't intervene right now, they are going to become long-term homeless and chronically homeless, and we have to find a way to intervene. Door of Hope prayed through and planned through being a part of the solution. I think that this is right in our backyard and if we don't step up, how can we ask the whole County to step up? Folks that really need the kind of intervention that Door of Hope provides, and we are actively outreaching to organizations that we think can help us identify those families. So that's the The Board, the staff, the leadership team and program leadership met... we need to expand our programs or service offerings to this community that has just lost their housing, and we need to do the same kinds of things that we have always done.*

*Door of Hope*

*Public benefits navigation, case management, rehousing, paying some rental assistance to bridge the gap to fill in the resources when FEMA is not on its way or when there was no renter's insurance, or renters' insurance is slow to pay. Bridge that gap to help families get off the street, get out of the convention center and the other emergency shelters--which of course we're so grateful for, but you can't manage your life from an emergency shelter. You can't rebuild your life from an emergency shelter. Those families need housing right now, and so...we're rolling out that plan to you in detail (see [Eaton Fire Housing Assistance Program](#)) and we're going to be **asking you for your support**, but right now I just want you to pray. I know that you guys are coming around your community, your friends, your churches, your support Networks. You're sending those donations into the GoFundMe pages, and that is so important and so good. And there are people that we don't see--that we don't know that are highly vulnerable right now--that are in absolute despair right now and that do not have the resources to even launch GoFundMe pages, nevertheless the Social Network of support, to bring along financial support at this time.*

*And that's who Door of Hope is called to In This Moment, is those low-income very vulnerable families who without intervention now are going to end up on the streets. Not just today, not just next month, but for a long time if we don't do something. So, thank you for your support all along for Door of Hope, and I can't wait for you to be part of our solution."*

## President's Corner

The extensive influence of chaplains and ministries who faithfully visit and provide spiritual mentorship to inmates cannot be understated, as they provide guidance to those seeking transformation and redemption during their time behind bars. Prison and jails' stressful, controlled and patrolled environment causes many inmates to feel isolation and depression, a common challenge during their sentence. It is no wonder they explore and embrace faith, and turn to religion during incarceration, as it provides them a sense of purpose, healing and the hope for a better future, both inside and outside prison walls.

Pew Research Center surveys found that nearly three-quarters (73%) of prison chaplains emphasized access to religion-related programs is "absolutely critical" for the successful rehabilitation of inmates. **Along Side Ministries** exemplify this with their in-prison mentorship model, which reaches deep into the heart of each inmate in their program. Their volunteers' personal investment and care are critical pieces in the long-term, 97% success rate of a reentering prisoner. And as **Joy Sparks, Executive Director of Fresh Coast Alliance** shares, success in the reentry journey following prison must also include meeting basic needs through wraparound care: housing, mental health and sobriety, employment and support of a community.

Serving USA's network of partners such as Along Side Ministries, Fresh Coast Alliance, and **Door of Hope**, and their commitment of demonstrating compassion to those most in need is unparalleled. We thank you for your support and encourage you to consider praying for the volunteers and the chaplains across the United States who demonstrate God's love as Jesus Christ did. By choosing to go into the darkest of places, they are "*sent to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.*" (Luke 4:18-19)


